On October 7, 2011, I attended a round table discussion concerning juvenile issues put on by the Worcester County District Attorney's Office. The discussion was held at Tantasqua Regional Senior High School. In attendance were staff members from both the Junior and Senior High schools and an officer from the Sturbridge Police Department.

On October 27th, Officer Jason White and I, along with members of the Sturbridge Police Department and Massachusetts State Police, participated in a school lock down drill at Tantasqua Regional Senior and Junior High Schools. These drills are conducted twice a year to help prepare students, staff and law enforcement officers for emergency situations which require the schools to be locked down for safety reasons.

The Police department faired well during the Halloween snow storm and the Department never lost power. The power outage that affected most of Brookfield kept our officers busy checking on the well being of many residents at the request of concerned family members.
