COMMISSION DISCLOSURE FORMS

All forms require Acrobat Reader.

You may print out the disclosure form and complete it by hand or complete the form electronically, then print it out and sign it. To complete a disclosure form electronically, position your cursor in the first box and enter text. Use Tab to move to the next entry, Shift-Tab to move to the previous entry and Return-Tab to return to the top. To save, hit the save icon on the Adobe Acrobat tool bar. Completed forms must be saved in Adobe Acrobat format (pdf).

1. Disclosure of Financial Interest by State or County Employee as required by G.L.c.268A §§6, 13
2. Determination by a State or County Appointing Official as required by G.L.c.268A §6, 13
3. Disclosure of Financial Interest by Public Official (as defined by G.L.c.268B §1) as required by G.L.c.268A §6A
4. Disclosure of Financial Interest by Special State Employee as required by G.L.c.268A § 7(d) and §7 (e)
5. Certification of Critical Need as required by G.L.c.268A §7
6. Disclosure of Financial Interest by a State Employee as required by G.L.c.268A §7(b)
7. Disclosure of Financial Interest by a Special County Employee as required by G.L.c.268A §14(c)
8. Disclosure of Financial Interest by a Municipal Employee and Appointing Authority Determination as required by G.L.c.268A §19(b)
9. Disclosure of Financial Interest by a Municipal Employee as required by G.L.c.268A §20(b)
10. Disclosure of Financial Interest by a Special Municipal Employee as required by G.L.c.268A §§20 (c) and §20(d)
11. Disclosure as required by G.L.c.268A §23(b)(3)

Commission Seeks Executive Director

The Massachusetts State Ethics Commission with responsibility to administer and enforce the Conflict of Interests and Financial Disclosure Laws seeks candidates for the position of Executive Director.

The Executive Director is responsible for the overall supervision, administration, direction and policies of the Commission staff. The staff of 23 consists of four units: Enforcement, Legal, Financial Disclosure and Public Education. Currently, the staff includes nine attorneys and five investigators.

The Executive Director's position requires considerable experience and skill both as an attorney and an administrator. Accordingly, candidates should have at least eight years legal experience; the demonstrated capacity to provide staff leadership and direction and to serve as the spokesperson for the Commission; and knowledge and familiarity with state government including both the budgetary process and the legislative process. The present salary range is \$100,000 to \$136,316.

The Ethics Commission was established to foster integrity in government and promote public trust. The Commission enforces the Conflict of Interest Law and the Financial Disclosure Law.

The Conflict of Interest Law regulates the conduct of all state, county and municipal employees and volunteers, whether paid or unpaid, full or part-time, intermittent or temporary. General Law chapter 268A governs what public officials and employees may do on the job, what they may do after hours, or on the side, and what they may do after they leave public service. The Financial Disclosure Law, G.L.c. 268B, requires certain individuals, officials and candidates for elected office to file statements of financial interests, or a S.F.I., with the Ethics Commission.
