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ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990 in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4 and to issue a note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990 in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4 and to issue a note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to foreclose on certain Tax Titles held by the Treasurer, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to foreclose on certain Tax Titles held by the Treasurer.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen or their agent to sell for the town any land or building acquired by the Town by Tax Title foreclosure after first giving notice of said sale by posting a notice at the Town Hall and Post Office 14 days at least before said sale stating what parcels are to be sold, or offered for sale and the time and place of holding said sale, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to instruct the Selectmen or their agent to sell for the town any land or building acquired by the Town by Tax Title foreclosure after first giving notice of said sale by posting a notice at the Town Hall and Post Office 14 days at least before said sale stating what parcels are to be sold, or offered for sale and the time and place of holding said sale.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Library Extension Account (grant from the state) to the Public Library Account, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to transfer the sum of \$3,624.06 from the Library Extension Account (grant from the state) to the Public Library Account.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer to the Library Expense Account the sum of money which was collected through December 31, 1989 for overdue books, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to transfer to the Library Expense Account the sum of \$623.50 which was collected through December 31, 1989 for overdue books.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer or borrow a sum of money to be used with or without funds allotted by the Commonwealth for the construction, reconstruction and improvement of town roads, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 to be used with or without funds allotted by the Commonwealth for the construction, reconstruction and improvement of town roads.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to transfer all Grave Fees received up to December 31, 1989 to the Cemetery Expense Account, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to transfer the sum of \$3,275.00 for Grave Fees received up to December 31, 1989 to the Cemetery Expense Account.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the interest accrued from the Cemetery Trust Funds to the Cemetery Expense Account, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to transfer the sum of \$3,500.00 from the interest accrued from the Cemetery Trust Funds to the Cemetery Expense Account.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the interest accrued from the Cemetery Trust Funds to the Cemetery Salary Account, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to transfer the sum of \$6,000.00 from the interest accrued from the Cemetery Trust Funds to the Cemetery Salary Account.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Cemetery Sale of Lots Fund to the Cemetery Improvement Account all the money received from the sale of lots up to December 31, 1989, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to transfer the sum of \$2,425.00 from the Cemetery Sale of Lots Fund to the Cemetery Improvement Account all the money received from the sale of lots up to December 31, 1989.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to enter into a compensating balance agreement or agreements for fiscal year 1991 pursuant to Chapter 44, section 53F of the Massachusetts General Laws, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to authorize its Treasurer to enter into a compensating balance agreement or agreements for fiscal year 1991 pursuant to Chapter 44, section 53F of the Massachusetts General Laws.

The town voted unanimously to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,267.20 to the town of Abington, Mass. the town of Brookfield's share of benefits paid to Mary Palopoli, widow of Leonard Palopoli, due as a result of services rendered to the Town of Brookfield in the years 1931-40.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept an Equal Educational Opportunity Grant for fiscal year 1991 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 70A, section 5, as inserted by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985 to be expended by the Tantasqua Regional School Committee for direct service expenditures, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to accept an Equal Educational Opportunity Grant for fiscal year 1991 in the amount of \$28,200.00 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 70A, section 5, as inserted by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985 to be expended by the Tantasqua Regional School Committee for direct service expenditures.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept an Equal Educational Opportunity Grant for fiscal year 1991 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 70A, section 5, as inserted by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985 to be expended by the Brookfield School Committee for direct service expenditures, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to accept an Equal Educational Opportunity Grant for fiscal year 1991 in the amount of \$33,535.00 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 70A, section 5, as inserted by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985 to be expended by the Brookfield School Committee for direct service expenditures.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer or borrow a sum of money to test for a new well site upstream of the two existing wells at the Quaboag Street pumping station by driving no more than four 2 1/2" test wells, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 to test for a new well site upstream of the two existing wells at the Quaboag Street pumping station by driving no more than four 2 1/2" test wells.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to delete Section 6 of Chapter XII of the By-Laws of the Town of Brookfield and to replace it with a new Section 2 which will read:

"Inoperable or Unregistered Motor Vehicles - No person shall park, store or otherwise place or leave in or upon land within the Town of Brookfield more than one inoperable motor vehicle for a period of more than thirty (30) days, nor more than one unregistered motor vehicle for more than sixty (60) days following the expiration date of the registration of said vehicle, except as hereinafter provided. Exceptions to the above shall include:

1. motor vehicles associated with commercial vehicle repair or service establishments, whether or not operable or registered, provided they are kept on property that is licensed and/or permitted under the zoning by-law of the town for such use;
2. farm and construction equipment;
3. motor vehicles within an enclosed building.

Definitions:

1. Inoperable or junk vehicle: a motor vehicle not capable of being used as such in its existing condition by reason of its having been damaged or dismantled or failing to contain functioning parts necessary for its operation.
2. Unregistered vehicle: a motor vehicle not bearing a valid, unexpired vehicle registration sticker issued by the Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles, or equivalent agency of another state or province., " or

take any action relative thereto.

The Town voted to amend No. 3 to read:

3. motor vehicles within an enclosed building or shielded from public view.

Vote: 62 Yes, 17 No

The Town voted to delete Section 6 of Chapter XII of the By-Laws of the Town of Brookfield and to replace it with a new Section 2 which will read:

"Inoperable or Unregistered Motor Vehicles - No person shall park, store or otherwise place or leave in or upon land within the Town of Brookfield more than one inoperable motor vehicle for a period of more than thirty (30) days, nor more than one unregistered motor vehicle for more than sixty (60) days following the expiration date of the registration of said vehicle, except as hereinafter provided. Exceptions to the above shall include:

1. motor vehicles associated with commercial vehicle repair or service establishments, whether or not operable or registered, provided they are kept on property that is licensed and/or permitted under the zoning by-law of the town for such use;
2. farm and construction equipment;
3. motor vehicles within an enclosed building or shielded from public view.

Definitions:

1. Inoperable or junk vehicle: a motor vehicle not capable of being used as such in its existing condition by reason of its having been damaged or dismantled or failing to contain functioning parts necessary for its operation.
2. Unregistered vehicle: a motor vehicle not bearing a valid, unexpired vehicle registration sticker issued by the Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles, or equivalent agency of another state or province.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 7.B.4. of the Zoning By-Law for the Town of Brookfield by adding the following sentence after the first sentence: "No rear lot shall be created when adequate frontage, from a property or a set of contiguous properties in common ownership as of January 1, 1990, is available to create a conforming lot.", or take any action relative thereto.

The Town voted to amend Section 7.B.4. of the Zoning By-Law for the Town of Brookfield by adding the following sentence after the first sentence: "No rear lot shall be created when adequate frontage, from a property or a set of contiguous properties in common ownership as of January 1, 1990, is available to create a conforming lot."

Vote: 59 Yes, 26 No

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 4.B.5. of the Zoning By-Law for the Town of Brookfield by deleting the phrase "(including more than one unregistered and/or non-operable automobile)" and adding Section 4.B.6. which will read:

"No person shall park, store or otherwise place or leave in or upon land within the Town of Brookfield more than one inoperable motor vehicle for a period of more than thirty (30) days, nor more than one unregistered motor vehicle for more than sixty (60) days following the expiration date of the registration of said vehicle, except as hereinafter provided. Exceptions to the above shall include:

1. motor vehicles associated with commercial vehicle repair or service establishments, whether or not operable or registered, provided they are kept on property that is licensed and/or permitted under the zoning by-law of the town for such use;
2. farm and construction equipment;
3. motor vehicles within an enclosed building.

Definitions:

1. Inoperable or junk vehicle: a motor vehicle not capable of being used as such in its existing condition by reason of its having been damaged or dismantled or failing to contain functioning parts necessary for its operation.
2. Unregistered vehicle: a motor vehicle not bearing a valid, unexpired vehicle registration sticker issued by the Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles, or equivalent agency of another state or province., " or take any action relative thereto.

The Town voted to amend No. 3 to read:

3. motor vehicles within an enclosed building or shielded from public view.

Majority Vote

The Town voted to amend Section 4.B.5. of the Zoning By-Law for the Town of Brookfield by deleting the phrase "(including more than one unregistered and/or non-operable automobile)" and adding Section 4.B.6. which will read:

"No person shall park, store or otherwise place or leave in or upon land within the Town of Brookfield more than one inoperable motor vehicle for a period of more than thirty (30) days, nor more than one unregistered motor vehicle for more than sixty (60) days following the expiration date of the registration of said vehicle, except as hereinafter provided. Exceptions to the above shall include:

1. motor vehicles associated with commercial vehicle repair or service establishments, whether or not operable or registered, provided they are kept on property that is licensed and/or permitted under the zoning by-law of the town for such use;
2. farm and construction equipment;
3. motor vehicles within an enclosed building or shielded from public view.

Definitions:

1. Inoperable or junk vehicle: a motor vehicle not capable of being used as such in its existing condition by reason of its having been damaged or dismantled or failing to contain functioning parts necessary for its operation.
2. Unregistered vehicle: a motor vehicle not bearing a valid, unexpired vehicle registration sticker issued by the Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles, or equivalent agency of another state or province.

Vote: 72 Yes, 7 No

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 11.A. of the Zoning By-Law for the Town of Brookfield by deleting the following sentences: "Any person violating the provisions of this by-law may be fined not more than three hundred (300) dollars for each offense. Each day that said violation continues shall constitute a separate offense." and by adding, after the words "enforcing body" the following:

1. Penalties - Criminal Disposition

Whoever violates any provision of the Brookfield Zoning By-Law may be penalized by indictment or complaint brought to the Superior Court, Housing Court or Worcester District Court. A penalty of \$300.00 shall be imposed for each violation. Each day on which a violation exists shall be deemed to be a separate offense.

2. Penalties - Non-Criminal Disposition

In addition to the procedures described above, the provisions of this by-law may be enforced by the Building Inspector, Zoning Enforcement Officer or the Selectmen by way of the non-criminal disposition procedure provided in the Mass. General Laws, Chapter 40, section 21D. Each day on which a violation exists constitutes a separate offense. The penalty for each offense shall be \$50.00.", or take any action relative

thereto.

The Town voted to amend Section 11.A. of the Zoning By-Law for the Town of Brookfield by deleting the following sentences: "Any person violating the provisions of this by-law may be fined not more than three hundred (300) dollars for each offense. Each day that said violation continues shall constitute a separate offense." and by adding, after the words "enforcing body" the following:

1. Penalties - Criminal Disposition

Whoever violates any provision of the Brookfield Zoning By-Law may be penalized by indictment or complaint brought to the Superior Court, Housing Court or Spencer District Court. A penalty of \$300.00 shall be imposed for each violation. Each day on which a violation exists shall be deemed to be a separate offense.

2. Penalties - Non-Criminal Disposition

In addition to the procedures described above, the provisions of this by-law may be enforced by the Building Inspector, Zoning Enforcement Officer or the Selectmen by way of the non-criminal disposition procedure provided in the Mass. General Laws, Chapter 40, section 21D. Each day on which a violation exists constitutes a separate offense. The penalty for each offense shall be \$50.00."

Vote: 69 Yes, 5 No

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Board of Health to employ a member or members of that board as sewer, food and health inspectors, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to allow the Board of Health to employ a member or members of that board as sewer, food and health inspectors at the rate of \$10.00 per hour.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Historical Commission to employ a member or members of that commission as clerk/typist, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to pass over this article.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer or borrow a sum of money to have the Town of Brookfield By-Law booklets revised and printed, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to transfer the sum of \$300.00 from Free Cash to have the Town of Brookfield By-Law booklets revised and printed.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer or borrow a sum of money for the purchase and installation of a device to make the second floor meeting hall accessible to the physically handicapped, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to pass over this article.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer or borrow a sum of money for the purchase of a larger capacity computer and supplies to enable the Board of Assessors to enter into the CAMA program (offered by the Department of Revenue) which will allow the Assessors to do the state-mandated triennial update of all properties themselves, or take any action relative thereto.

The town voted unanimously to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,000.00 for purchase of an AT&T 6386/314 computer and related peripherals, to enable the Board of Assessors to enter into the DOR CAMA program, contingent upon Department of Revenue acceptance.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer or borrow a sum of money to conduct the state-mandated triennial update of valuations of all properties in town.

The town voted unanimously to transfer from the Stabilization Fund the sum of \$14,800.00 to contract for the state-mandated triennial update of valuations of all properties in town.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting up attested copies thereof, at the Town Hall and Post Office in said Town, seven days at least before the time of the holding of said meeting.

HEREOF, FAIL NOT, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of the meeting, as aforesaid. Given under our hands this 17th day of April in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and ninety.
